
### **Maternal and Child Health Block Grant 2023**

The Maternal and Child Health Services Block Grant, Title V of the Social Security Act, is the only federal program devoted to improving the health of all women, children, and families. In Fiscal Year 2021, 92% of all pregnant women, 98% of infants, and 58% of children nationwide benefitted from a Title V-supported service. ### State spotlight: Newborn Screening

The Alabama Newborn Screening Program (ANSP) is administered statewide by the Alabama Department of Public Health (ADPH), in partnership with public and private providers. The newborn screening includes bloodspot screens, hearing screens, and pulse oximetry screens to detect critical congenital heart defects. In partnership with ADPH, CRS audiologists provide second-tier newborn hearing screenings and offer diagnostic evaluations, intervention services, and hearing aid fitting, orientation, verification and validation. Newborn screening is offered through all of Alabama's 46 birthing hospitals. The goal of ANSP is to identify certain genetic and congenital disorders early to reduce infant morbidity, death, intellectual disability, and other developmental disabilities.

### Current Special Projects of Regional and National Significance (SPRANS)

Special Projects of Regional and National Significance (SPRANS) funding complements the formula funding each state receives and helps ensure the success of state Title V, Medicaid, and CHIP programs by driving innovation, responding to emerging and entrenched issues, and building capacity for integrated systems of care for women, children, and families.
