
#### **Maternal and Child Health Block Grant 2023**

The Maternal and Child Health Services Block Grant, Title V of the Social Security Act, is the only federal program devoted to improving the health of all women, children, and families. In Fiscal Year 2021, 92% of all pregnant women, 98% of infants, and 58% of children nationwide benefitted from a Title V-supported service. 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### State spotlights: Child and Adolescent Health

Twenty-two local child health agencies provided child health direct and enabling services to approximately 175,249 children, ages 0 to 22 years in all 99 counties. The child health agencies serve as the community utility to link families to medical and dental homes. The child health programs help families access physical examinations, vision and hearing screening, dental education, and referral. They may also provide gap-filling services, such as immunizations, developmental, nutrition and psychosocial screenings, and laboratory tests including blood lead testing. The program is a collaborative effort between lowa's Medicaid agency and state and community Title V programs.

### **Current Special Projects of Regional and National Significance (SPRANS)**

Special Projects of Regional and National Significance (SPRANS) funding complements the formula funding each state receives and helps ensure the success of state Title V, Medicaid, and CHIP programs by driving innovation, responding to emerging and entrenched issues, and building capacity for integrated systems of care for women, children, and families.
