
#### Maternal and Child Health Block Grant 2023

The Maternal and Child Health Services Block Grant, Title V of the Social Security Act, is the only federal program devoted to improving the health of all women, children, and families. In Fiscal Year 2021, 92% of all pregnant women, 98% of infants, and 58% of children nationwide benefitted from a Title V-supported service. ### State spotlight: School-based Health Centers

School-based health centers represent an excellent example of improved health care access through existing institutions, where children and youth are located. School-based health centers are an evidence-based practice for providing health care to hard-to-reach pediatric populations, particularly youth who are at risk for poor health outcomes. The Division of Disease Prevention utilizes school-based health centers as an avenue to reach underserved youth and to connect them with a primary care provider and medical home. All middle and high school students participating in a school-based health center receive a health risk assessment within their first three visits to the health center.

### **Current Special Projects of Regional and National Significance (SPRANS)**

Special Projects of Regional and National Significance (SPRANS) funding complements the formula funding each state receives and helps ensure the success of state Title V, Medicaid, and CHIP programs by driving innovation, responding to emerging and entrenched issues, and building capacity for integrated systems of care for women, children, and families.
