
#### **Maternal and Child Health Block Grant 2023**

The Maternal and Child Health Services Block Grant, Title V of the Social Security Act, is the only federal program devoted to improving the health of all women, children, and families. In Fiscal Year 2021, 92% of all pregnant women, 98% of infants, and 58% of children nationwide benefitted from a Title V-supported service. ## State spotlight: Children & Youth with Special Healthcare Needs

Children's Special Health Services (CSHS) within the Montana Department of Public Health and Human Services manages programs to support families, educate providers, and connect them to resources for children and youth with special healthcare needs (CYSHCN). CSHS collaborates with diverse family lead organizations and partners such as Circle of Parents, Hands and Voices, Rural Institute for Inclusive Communities Transition Project, and the Parent Partner program. In 2020, the Parent Partner Program worked directly with 364 children's families identifying their needs, providing family-to-family support and connecting them to resources. The Circle of Parents program prevents child abuse and neglect through strengthening families in mutual self-help parent lead support groups in towns across the state. In 2019, CSHS launched the Montana Access to Pediatric Psychiatry Network (MAPP-Net) to provide valuable education and support to Primary Care providers treating CYSHCN with behavioral and mental health needs. In 2020, the Psychiatric Access Line was launched to connect rural healthcare providers with mental health professionals for consultation during business hours.

## **Current Special Projects of Regional and National Significance (SPRANS)**

Special Projects of Regional and National Significance (SPRANS) funding complements the formula funding each state receives and helps ensure the success of state Title V, Medicaid, and CHIP programs by driving innovation, responding to emerging and entrenched issues, and building capacity for integrated systems of care for women, children, and families.
