
### **Maternal and Child Health Block Grant 2023**

The Maternal and Child Health Services Block Grant, Title V of the Social Security Act, is the only federal program devoted to improving the health of all women, children, and families. In Fiscal Year 2021, 92% of all pregnant women, 98% of infants, and 58% of children nationwide benefitted from a Title V-supported service. ## State spotlight: Children with Special Health Care Needs

The New Jersey Department of Health Special Child Health Services (SCHS) Program, with a combination of State and Federal funds, promotes early identification, evaluation, diagnosis and treatment of children with special health needs. SCHS is focused on providing family-centered, community- based services that are individualized and accessible. Individuals from birth to 21 years of age who have any of a broad range of disabilities or chronic illnesses may benefit from the available child health services, which include newborn screening and genetics, specialized pediatrics, case management, and early identification and monitoring. SCHS also collaborates with Early Intervention Services to ensure children birth to three are appropriately referred for services.

## **Current Special Projects of Regional and National Significance (SPRANS)**

Special Projects of Regional and National Significance (SPRANS) funding complements the formula funding each state receives and helps ensure the success of state Title V, Medicaid, and CHIP programs by driving innovation, responding to emerging and entrenched issues, and building capacity for integrated systems of care for women, children, and families.
