
#### **Maternal and Child Health Block Grant 2023**

The Maternal and Child Health Services Block Grant, Title V of the Social Security Act, is the only federal program devoted to improving the health of all women, children, and families. In Fiscal Year 2021, 92% of all pregnant women, 98% of infants, and 58% of children nationwide benefitted from a Title V-supported service. #### **State spotlight: Addressing Severe Maternal Morbidity**

New Mexico has been participating in the Alliance for Innovation on Maternal Health (AIM) to advance maternal safety bundles since 2019. The bundles for severe hypertension in pregnancy and obstetric hemorrhage have participation from nearly 100% of New Mexico's non-federal birthing facilities (2023). A diverse partnership of public health advocates, community and clinical providers has collaborated to launch the Care for Pregnant and Postpartum People with Substance Use Disorder to improve support for families across the state. These safety bundles are one way New Mexico seeks to improve severe maternal morbidity and mortality outcomes for birthing people in NM.

### **Current Special Projects of Regional and National Significance (SPRANS)**

Special Projects of Regional and National Significance (SPRANS) funding complements the formula funding each state receives and helps ensure the success of state Title V, Medicaid, and CHIP programs by driving innovation, responding to emerging and entrenched issues, and building capacity for integrated systems of care for women, children, and families.
