## Maternal and Child Health Block Grant 2023

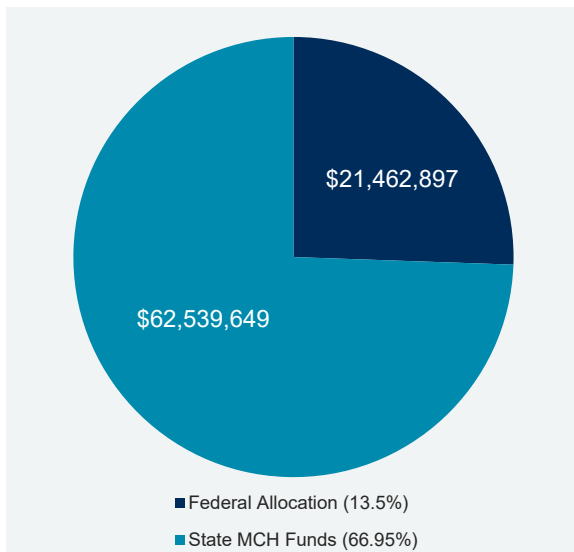
The Maternal and Child Health Services Block Grant, Title V of the Social Security Act, is the only federal program devoted to improving the health of all women, children, and families. In Fiscal Year 2021, 92% of all pregnant women, 98% of infants, and 58% of children nationwide benefitted from a Title V-supported service. ## State spotlight: Children and Youth with Special Healthcare Needs

Ohio's Title V program for children and youth with special healthcare needs has expanded its age eligibility through age 22. The program formerly covered eligible clients until their 21st birthday. Beginning July 1, 2022, clients are now eligible until their 23rd birthday. The program will be changing its name from the Children with Medical Handicaps program and effective July 1, 2023, will be known as the Complex Medical Help program.

Special Projects of Regional and National Significance (SPRANS) funding complements the formula funding each state receives and helps ensure the success of state Title V, Medicaid, and CHIP programs by driving innovation, responding to emerging and entrenched issues, and building capacity for integrated systems of care for women, children, and families.
