
#### **Maternal and Child Health Block Grant 2023**

The Maternal and Child Health Services Block Grant, Title V of the Social Security Act, is the only federal program devoted to improving the health of all women, children, and families. In Fiscal Year 2021, 92% of all pregnant women, 98% of infants, and 58% of children nationwide benefitted from a Title V-supported service. #### State spotlight: Pregnancy Postpartum Death Review Committee

The Pregnancy Postpartum Death Review Committee (PPDRC) is a multidisciplinary committee that reviews RI's pregnancy-related deaths. Members identify contributing factors, recommend interventions to prevent future deaths, and improve care systems. The 50-member committee includes various experts and community representatives. Since the committee's inception it has reviewed 14 cases and identified the following recommendations:

- Perinatal care should be coordinated and continuous.
- Perinatal behavioral health services should be expanded and sustained in the postpartum period.
- Emergency protocols for pregnant people should be prioritized, practiced, and implemented.
- All perinatal services and supports should be centered in equity to address the structural and social determinants of health.

#### **Current Special Projects of Regional and National Significance (SPRANS)**

Special Projects of Regional and National Significance (SPRANS) funding complements the formula funding each state receives and helps ensure the success of state Title V, Medicaid, and CHIP programs by driving innovation, responding to emerging and entrenched issues, and building capacity for integrated systems of care for women, children, and families.
