
Maternal and Child Health Block Grant 2023

The Maternal and Child Health Services Block Grant, Title V of the Social Security Act, is the only federal program devoted to improving the health of all women, children, and families. In Fiscal Year 2021, 92% of all pregnant women, 98% of infants, and 58% of children nationwide benefitted from a Title V-supported service. To learn more about Title V, visit www.amchp.org.

State spotlight: Child and Adolescent Safety

Firearm deaths are the leading cause of death in children and youth aged 0-19 in South Carolina. From 2003-2020, 540 children in South Carolina died due to a firearm discharge. South Carolina's Child Well-Being Coalition works with pediatricians, community safety groups, and early childhood organizations to provide gun locks to families at no cost. Since 2022, over 1,700 gun locks have been distributed across the state to educate parents on firearm safety, suicide prevention, and reduce the risk of accidental injuries.

Current Special Projects of Regional and National Significance (SPRANS)

Special Projects of Regional and National Significance (SPRANS) funding complements the formula funding each state receives and helps ensure the success of state Title V, Medicaid, and CHIP programs by driving innovation, responding to emerging and entrenched issues, and building capacity for integrated systems of care for women, children, and families.
