
Maternal and Child Health Block Grant 2023

The Maternal and Child Health Services Block Grant, Title V of the Social Security Act, is the only federal program devoted to improving the health of all women, children, and families. In Fiscal Year 2021, 92% of all pregnant women, 98% of infants, and 58% of children nationwide benefitted from a Title V-supported service. To learn more about Title V, visit www.amchp.org.

State spotlight: Women's Health

Marshall Islands Maternal and Child Health (MCH) and Family Planning (FP) mobile visits program visits 14 atolls, including at least six outer islands yearly, to provide cervical cancer screening, breast exam and family planning services to the hard-to-reach populations in the remote islands. These activities were implemented in collaboration with other public health programs which include STI/HIV, NCD (Diabetes and Hypertension), Immunization, and dental. Family planning clients are provided with counselling and methods desired as well as cervical cancer screening and basic prenatal care to pregnant mothers. Program also conducted one on one counselling on the availability and importance of annual check ups, spacing of pregnancy as well as early prenatal care.

Current Special Projects of Regional and National Significance (SPRANS)

Special Projects of Regional and National Significance (SPRANS) funding complements the formula funding each state receives and helps ensure the success of state Title V, Medicaid, and CHIP programs by driving innovation, responding to emerging and entrenched issues, and building capacity for integrated systems of care for women, children, and families.
