
#### Maternal and Child Health Block Grant 2024

The Maternal and Child Health Services Block Grant, Title V of the Social Security Act, is the only federal program devoted to improving the health of all women, children, and families. In Fiscal Year 2022, 93% of all pregnant women, 99% of infants, and 61% of children nationwide benefitted from a Title V-supported service. ## State spotlights: Children and Youth with Special Health Care Needs

The Children with Special Health Needs Branch increases access to community-based, coordinated health care for children and youth with special health care needs (CYSHCN) through direct and/or contracted services, partnerships, guidelines, and education. The CYSHCN Program increases access to family-centered, community-based health care for CYSHCN and their families through service coordination, specialty clinics, and work with youth and health care providers. The goal is to optimize the growth and development opportunities for CYSHCN and promote a successful transition to adult health care. Other programs address newborn hearing screening, newborn metabolic screening, developmental screening, childhood lead poisoning prevention, early childhood, early intervention, genetics, and birth defects surveillance.

### **Current Special Projects of Regional and National Significance (SPRANS)**

Special Projects of Regional and National Significance (SPRANS) funding complements the formula funding each state receives and helps ensure the success of state Title V. Medicaid, and CHIP programs by driving innovation, responding to emerging and entrenched issues, and building capacity for integrated systems of care for women, children, and families.
