
Maternal and Child Health Block Grant 2024

The Maternal and Child Health Services Block Grant, Title V of the Social Security Act, is the only federal program devoted to improving the health of all women, children, and families. State spotlight: Expanding and Resourcing Doula Work in New Mexico

New Mexico Black, Indigenous and People of Color policy experts worked with the New Mexico Medicaid leadership to design a reimbursement package for doulas to go live on July 1, 2024. With support from the New Mexico Department of Health, the work of the policy experts was sustained during this planning period, and Title V works to support doula and community health worker sustainability across New Mexico.
