Title V Maternal & Child Health Block Grant

The Association of Maternal & Child Health Programs (AMCHP) calls on Congress to fund the Title V Maternal and Child Health (MCH) Services Block Grant at **\$1 billion for FY2025**. ←

The MCH Block Grant, authorized by Title V of the Social Security Act, is the only federal program of its kind devoted solely to improving the health of all women and children in the United States. It is guided by the principles of evidence, flexibility, and results. **In FY2022, programs funded by the MCH Block Grant served 93% of pregnant women, 99% of infants, and 61% of children nationwide.**

Increased investments in both the state formula fund and the SPRANS portion of the MCH Block Grant are needed to scale effective public health programs, meaningfully impact more families, and address long-standing racial, ethnic, and geographic inequities in maternal and child health outcomes. The MCH Block Grant is the backbone of our nation's public health infrastructure for women, children, and families, but that infrastructure has been severely strained by a burnt-out workforce and ongoing and emerging public health needs. Title V needs sustained, increased funding to best serve our nation's families now and in the future.





MCH Block Grant Highlights

- Builds local and community-based workforce capacity to address cultural awareness, racism, and implicit bias
- Promotes access to high quality, family-centered health care for all children, including those with special health care needs
- Broadens the inclusivity of state and local maternal and child health data collection
- Addresses social determinants of health to improve pregnancy, birth, and infant health outcomes
- Reduces racial and ethnic disparities in maternal, child, and infant mortality rates

Another key component of the MCH Block Grant is the Special Projects of Regional and National Significance (SPRANS).

SPRANS funding complements and helps ensure the success of state Title V, Medicaid, and CHIP programs by driving innovation, responding to emerging and entrenched issues, and building capacity for integrated systems of care for women and children.

Key projects funded through SPRANS include:

- State Maternal Health Innovation grants
- The Maternal Health Learning & Innovation Center (MHLIC)
- Women's Preventive Services Initiative
- MCH workforce training programs
- Adverse childhood experiences research
- School-based health services network
- Child and adolescent injury prevention resource centers

AMCHP's Role

The Association of Maternal & Child Health Programs (AMCHP) leads and supports programs nationally to protect and promote the optimal health of women, children, youth, families, and communities. For over 75 years, AMCHP has served as a national resource, partner, and advocate for state public health leaders and others working to improve maternal and child health. Complementing other federally funded programs, such as home visiting, community health centers, Healthy Start, WIC, autism initiatives, CHIP, and Medicaid
