Application Summary

AMCHP is requesting applications for 15 interns to participate in the 12-week Summer 2026 GSEP cohort. During the internship, interns will onboard and coordinate with the host site supervisor, conduct quantitative and qualitative data analysis as needed, learn about maternal and child health populations and programs, and attend weekly enrichment sessions on carefully selected maternal and child health epidemiology topics. The products resulting from the GSEP internship will serve both the host site's data and/or programmatic needs and as additions to the intern's suite of quality deliverables. The AMCHP website contains the most up to date information.

What are we looking for in a GSEP intern?

- ✓ Currently or recently enrolled graduate students with a strong, demonstrated interest in epidemiology and maternal and child health, inclusive of, but not limited to:
 - Children and youth with special healthcare needs
 - Nutrition
 - o Public health infrastructure
 - Other special interests in maternal and child health
- ✓ Current graduate students or recent graduates (Fall/Winter 2025) who have completed at least one (1) year of coursework prior to the start of the internship in May.
- ✓ U.S citizens, non-citizen nationals, or U.S. Permanent Residents as defined by the <u>U.S. Citizenship</u> and <u>Immigration Services website</u>.
- ✓ Ability to commit to 40 hours per week of work for the duration of the 12-week internship, which is 100% virtual.

Intern Expectations

It is expected that the intern will contribute 40 hours per week (broken down by activity below) for 12 weeks from May 26, 2026 to August 14, 2026. It is also expected that interns will attend an orientation session, complete all deliverables in a timely manner, and actively participate in **all** mandatory AMCHP-led enrichment activities. All interns will receive a total stipend of \$9,200, disbursed over three (3) points in a predetermined schedule.

 Attend weekly one-hour peer sharing and learning sessions with a small subset 	
of cohort members that is consistent across the internship period.

Attend office hours with maternal and child health epidemiology leaders.	
Complete asynchronous readings, videos, podcasts, and other media that	
support the respective week's theme as outlined in the curriculum.
